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Killings and Abductions in Nigeria: October – December 2022

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Key Findings

Section 1: Summary data on killings in Nigeria's geopolitical zones and states

- ➤ In Q4-2021, a total of 805 Christians were reported as killed, whereas in Q4-2022, the number increased to 818. Q4-2021 recorded 463 reported killings of Muslims, which decreased to 371 in Q4-2022. Comparing the two years, there was a 2% rise in the number of killings of Christians and a 20% decrease in the number of killings of Muslims. The ratio of Christians to Muslims killed in Q4-2022 was 2.2 to 1, whereas in Q4-2021, it was 1.7 to 1.
- When considering the proportionality of Christians and Muslims in different Nigerian states, the numerical value of Christians killed in Q4-2021 was 3,126. In Q4-2022, this number decreased to 1,924. Specifically, the total number of Muslims killed in Q4-2021 was 463, while in Q4-2022 it decreased to 317. Taking into account their proportions in the various states, the ratio of Christians to Muslims killed in Q4-2022 was 6.1 to 1, whereas in Q4-2021, it was 6.8 to 1.

Section 2: Summary data on abductions in Nigeria's geopolitical zones and states

- ➤ In Q4-2021, a total of 828 Christians were reported as abducted, while in Q4-2022, the number increased to 951. Similarly, the number of Muslims abducted in Q4-2021 was 576, which rose to 805 in Q4-2022. Both religious groups experienced an increase in abductions during this period. For Christians, there was a 15% increase, resulting in a total of 951 abductions. In contrast, Muslims witnessed a 40% increase, totaling 805 abductions. When comparing the two periods, the ratio of Christians to Muslims abducted in Q4-2022 was 1.2 to 1, whereas in Q4-2021, it was 1.4 to 1.
- When considering the proportionality of Christians and Muslims in different Nigerian states, the numerical value of Christians abducted in Q4-2021 was 2,325. In Q4-2022, this number increased to 3,523. Specifically, the total number of Muslims abducted in Q4-2021 was 576, while in Q4-2022, it increased to 805. Taking into account their proportions in the various states, the ratio of Christians to Muslims abducted in Q4-2022 was **4.4 to 1**, whereas in Q4-2021, it was **4.0 to 1**.

• Section 3: Distinguishing attacks on geographic communities from other attacks¹

Civilians (totals of Christians and Muslims) killed during attacks

- ➤ In Q4-2022, there was a 38% decrease in the number of attacks targeting communities with casualties, compared to Q4-2021. However, there was a 23% increase in the number of other attacks.
- During both Q4-2021 and Q4-2022, the majority of civilian casualties occurred as a result of attacks on communities.
- ➤ In both Q34-2021 and Q4-2022, there was a notable similarity in the typical differentiation between attacks targeting communities and other attacks with casualties. On average, the number of civilians killed per community attack was 5 to 7 times higher compared to other attacks.

Civilians (totals of Christians and Muslims) abducted during attacks

- ➤ In Q4-2022, there was a 29% decrease in the number of attacks targeting communities with abductions, compared to Q4-2021. However, during the same period, there was a 13% increase in other attacks.
- ➤ In Q4-2021, most civilians were abducted during attacks on communities. However, in Q4-2022, the majority of civilians were abducted during other attacks.
- ➤ During both Q4-2021 and Q4-2022, the average number of civilians abducted per attack on communities was approximately 1.5 to 2 times higher than per other attack. In both categories of attacks, the average number of abductions per attack exceeded the average number of killings per attack.

Section 4: Gender and age of Christians victims

Killings – age and gender of Christians

➤ During the reporting period, information was accessible regarding 377 out of 818 Christians who lost their lives, accounting for 46% of the total. Among those killed, 326 were adults (40%), while 50 were children or young individuals (6%). The ages of 441 Christians who were killed (54%) remain unidentified. In incidents targeting communities or otherwise, the number of Christian adults killed significantly exceeded the number of Christian children, surpassing it by more than seven times.

➤ Out of the total Christian fatalities, 289 were males (35%) and 87 were females (11%). The gender of 441 Christians who were killed (54%) remains unknown. In incidents involving

attacks on communities or otherwise, the number of male Christian casualties far exceeded that of female Christians, surpassing it by more than three times.

Abductions – age and gender of Christians

- ➤ During the specified reporting period, information was obtained for 312 out of 953 abducted Christians, representing 33% of the total. Among the abductions, 259 involved Christian adults (27%), while 53 involved Christian children or youth (6%). The age of 641 Christians who were abducted (67%) remains unknown. Notably, in incidents targeting communities or otherwise, the number of Christian adults abducted greatly exceeded the number of Christian children, surpassing it by a factor of five.
- ➤ Out of the total Christian abductions, 153 were males (16%) and 160 were females (17%). The gender of 641 Christians who were abducted (67%) remains unknown. During the incidents involving attacks on communities or otherwise, the number of Christian males abducted and the number of Christian females abducted were almost equal, with a slightly higher count of Christian females being abducted compared to Christian males.

Introduction

Starting in 2019, ORFA initiated a collaborative data gathering project with Nigerian partners to document and report on incidents of killings and abductions taking place in Nigeria. ORFA has since released violence data reports that encompass the timeframe from October 1, 2019, to September 2022.².

ORFA will be issuing quarterly update reports throughout the year, and this report marks the first of such updates. It provides an initial overview of violence incidents that transpired between October 1, 2022, and December 31, 2022, along with a comparison to the corresponding period in the previous year. It is important to note that certain incidents from this reporting period are currently undergoing review, meaning that this report is not a final assessment for the mentioned timeframe. Once additional incidents have been verified, they will be incorporated into forthcoming reports.

The project aimed to provide a comprehensive record of incidents involving killings and abductions. This encompassed incidents affecting civilians, including their religious affiliations, as well as those involving the security forces and perpetrators categorized as 'Terror Groups' (refer to Section 1 below). Beginning with this report, the data gathering process now includes collecting additional information on the gender and age of Christian victims. However, due to various factors, it may not always be feasible to obtain these details for all victims, resulting in an incomplete representation of all victims. In this initial report, age and gender information is available for approximately 50% of the Christian victims, with the expectation that this percentage will improve in future reporting periods.

This report focuses exclusively on incidents of killings and abductions within the framework of a "culture of

violence" perpetuated by 'Terror Groups' such as Boko Haram, ISWAP, armed Fulani herders, bandits³, and other smaller groups. While numerous factors contribute to the situation, violent Islamism, as a religious ideology, plays a significant role. Incidents of killings and abductions that are deemed unrelated to the activities of 'Terror Groups' (such as communal clashes) have been excluded from this analysis.

Despite diligent efforts, a data-gathering project such as this is inherently incomplete, as a significant amount of violence often remains unreported. Nonetheless, the researchers involved in this project maintain confidence that the provided data offers a balanced assessment of the prevailing situation in the country during the reporting period.

The figures provided in this report solely account for the confirmed victims of killings and abductions; however, it is crucial to acknowledge that numerous others have been significantly affected. Incidents involving killings and abductions often encompass a wide range of violence and suffering: communities being raided or forcibly occupied, individuals being injured or permanently disabled, women and girls being subjected to rape, houses, shops, and businesses being destroyed or taken over, agricultural fields being ravaged or occupied, houses of worship being abandoned, closed, or demolished, and people being forced into internally displaced situations under dire circumstances. Ransom payments not only push families and religious communities to the brink of financial ruin but also inadvertently finance the operations of the 'Terror Groups.'

How was the violence information collated?

Throughout the reporting period, ORFA's primary partner organization in Nigeria reported approximately 50% of the incidents. They collected on-the-ground information through their network. The remaining incidents were obtained through the efforts of ORFA researchers and other local partners, and by sifting through the public data sets of other organizations.⁴

ORFA recognizes the importance of including attributes such as religious background to gain a comprehensive understanding of the extent and characteristics of the violence.

ORFA's primary partner organization has a deliberate approach to capturing data regarding the religion, age, and gender of victims. However, it should be noted that other local partners and organizations do not collect this specific data. Consequently, ORFA's primary partner organization took the responsibility of reviewing and validating the incidents reported by others, as well as gathering supplementary data points such as religious background, gender, and age.

As part of their standard procedure, ORFA researchers employ a triangulation approach to cross-reference information obtained from various sources. This ensures that incidents are not reported multiple times and facilitates the provision of comprehensive and pertinent details. It was observed that there were instances where incidents initially reported by ORFA's primary partner organization were subsequently

reported by ORFA researchers or other organizations. These additional reports played a valuable role by either corroborating existing information gathered from other sources or offering new insights into specific incidents.

Why does the report include the religious background of the civilian victims?

The report addresses the distinction in religious background among civilian victims due to the existence of conflicting analyzes regarding the causes of violence in Nigeria. Some analyzes attribute the violence primarily to a "classical" conflict between herders and farmers, exacerbated by environmental degradation in the wider region⁵. Conversely, other analyses emphasize the overarching influence of Usman Dan Fodio, a Fulani radical Islamic scholar who initiated an Islamic jihad in Gobir in 1804 and subsequently established the Sokoto Caliphate by 1808. His mission was to enforce Islam through the use of force, extending from the Sahara Desert in the north to the Atlantic Ocean in the south.

ORFA remains impartial and refrains from taking sides. The primary objective of the Observatory is to allow the data to speak for itself without any intentional bias towards either of the narratives mentioned earlier.

1. Summary data on killings in Nigeria's geopolitical zones and states

Individuals who lost their lives within the context of the culture of violence instigated by 'Terror Groups' were categorized based on their religious background, namely Christian, Muslim, or African Traditional Religionist (ATR). There were instances where the religious identity of the victims remained unknown. The data also encompasses members of the security forces who were killed, as well as members of the 'Terror Groups' who met the same fate.

This report includes the numbers of Muslims who were killed in incidents involving self-defense actions by Christian local vigilantes, as well as retaliatory attacks by Christians on Muslims. However, the data reveals that the majority of Muslim victims were targeted by the same perpetrators responsible for killing Christians, ATR practitioners, and members of the security forces. Consequently, it is crucial to understand that most of the Muslims reported as victims by ORFA should not be viewed as victims of Christians, but rather as victims of radicalized groups within their own religious community.

Table 1 compares the killings recorded for the two reporting periods under study:

- i. October to December 2021 indicated in the column headings as Q4-2021.
- ii. October to December 2022 indicated in the column headings as Q4-2022.

In Q4-2021, the total number of people killed was 3,203, while in Q4-2022, it reached 3,462. This indicates an increase in the number of killings during Q4-2022 compared to Q4-2021.

Christians and Muslims killed from October to December 2022 as compared to October to December 2021

The comparison of the total number of Christians and Muslims killed in the two reporting periods can be made using Table 1. The data indicates that Christians were impacted to a greater extent by killings within the context of attacks carried out by 'Terror Groups'.

- In Q4-2021, a total of 805 Christians were killed, whereas in Q4-2022, the number increased to 818. This indicates a rise in the number of Christians killed during Q4-2022.
- During Q4-2021, a total of 463 Muslims were killed, while in Q4-2022, the number decreased to 371. This indicates a decline in the number of Muslims killed during Q4-2022.
- In Q4-2022, there was a 2% increase in killings of Christians compared to the previous year, while for Muslims, there was a decrease of 20%. The ratio of Christians to Muslims killed in Q4-2022 was **2.2 to 1**, whereas in Q4-2021, it was **1.7 to 1**.

Table 1 indicates a notable rise in the number of members of 'Terror Groups' killed, increasing from 1,491 in 2022 to 2,113 in 2023. Conversely, there was a decline in the number of security forces killed, decreasing from 262 in 2022 to 110 in 2023.

The overall ratio of Christians to Muslims killed fails to consider the varying population sizes of Christians and Muslims across the different states of Nigeria.

The total number of Christians and Muslims killed per reporting period - adjusted according to population percentages in the Nigerian States

By referring to Table 2, it becomes possible to compare the total number of Christians and Muslims killed in the two reporting periods, while considering the population levels of Christians and Muslims in the different states. The data strongly indicates that Christians were disproportionately impacted by killings within the context of attacks by 'Terror Groups':

- In Q4-2021, based on the proportional representation of Christians and Muslims in the different Nigerian states, the numerical value of Christians killed was 3,126. In Q4-2022, this number decreased to 1,924.
- During Q4-2021, the total number of Muslims killed was 463, which reduced to 317 in Q4-2022.
- Taking into consideration their proportions in the various states, the ratio of Christians to Muslims killed in Q4-2022 was **6.1 to 1**, compared to **6.8 to 1** in Q4-2021.

2. Summary data on abductions in Nigeria's geopolitical zones and states

In this section, a similar approach has been employed as in Section 1 to analyze the abductions. Individuals who were abducted within the context of the culture of violence fostered by 'Terror Groups' were categorized based on their religious affiliation: Christian, Muslim, or African Traditional Religionist (ATR). In certain instances, the religious identity of the victims was unidentified. The data also encompasses security force members who were abducted.

Table 3 compares registered abductions for the three reporting periods under study:

- i. October to December 2021 indicated in the column headings as Q4-2021.
- ii. October to December 2022 indicated in the column headings as Q4-2022.

During Q4-2021, a total of 1,508 individuals were abducted, while in Q4-2022, the number increased to 1,770. This indicates a rise in abductions during Q4-2022 compared to Q4-2021.

Christians and Muslims abducted from January to March 2023 as compared to January to March 2022

By referring to Table 3, it becomes possible to compare the total number of Christians and Muslims abducted in the reporting periods. The data indicates that Christians were marginally more affected by abductions within the context of attacks by 'Terror Groups':

- In Q4-2021, the total number of Christians abducted was 828, which increased to 951 in Q4-2022. This indicates a rise in the number of Christians abducted during Q4-2022.
- Similarly, in Q4-2021, the total number of Muslims abducted was 576, which increased to 805 in Q4-2022. This also signifies an increase in the number of Muslims abducted during Q4-2022.
- Both religious groups experienced an increase in abductions during this period. For Christians, there was a 15% increase to 951, while for Muslims, there was a 40% increase to 805. The ratio of Christians to Muslims abducted in Q4-2022 was 1.2 to 1, compared to 1.4 to 1 in Q4-2021.

The overall ratio of Christians to Muslims abducted does not consider the varying population sizes of Christians and Muslims in the different Nigerian states.

The total number of Christians and Muslims abducted per reporting period - adjusted according to population percentages

By referring to Table 4, it becomes possible to compare the total number of Christians and Muslims abducted in the reporting periods, while considering the population levels of Christians and Muslims in the different states. The updated data now unequivocally demonstrates that Christians were disproportionately affected by abductions within the context of attacks by 'Terror Groups':

- In Q4-2021, based on the proportional representation of Christians and Muslims in the different Nigerian states, the numerical value of Christians abducted compared to Muslims abducted was 2,325. In Q4-2022, this number increased to 3,523.
- During Q4-2021, the total number of Muslims abducted was 576, which rose to 805 in Q4-2022.
- When considering their proportions in the various states, the ratio of Christians to Muslims abducted in Q4-2022 was **4.4 to 1**, compared to **4.0 to 1** in Q4-2021.

3. Distinguishing attacks on communities from other attacks

Two important clarifications:

- i. The data presented in this section represents the directly recorded numbers and does not account for the proportional representation of Christian and Muslim populations in the different states. Considering proportionality would further highlight the observed trends.
- ii. The numbers provided for civilians encompass both Christian and Muslim civilians, while the figures for "Unknown Religious Identity (includes ATR)" are not included. This omission is intentional to allow for potential future analysis (not conducted in this document). Given the low numbers in the "Unknown Religious Identity (includes ATR)" category, it does not undermine the conclusions drawn in this section.

This section delves deeper into the analysis of attacks that result in killings or abductions, specifically differentiating between **attacks on communities** and **other attacks**. Consequently, the focus of the analysis is on civilians affected by these attacks, rather than on the casualties among security forces or 'Terror Groups'.

Attacks on communities have a particularly devastating impact on the victims. As mentioned in the introduction, these attacks often encompass a wide range of violence and suffering, including loss of life or abductions, injuries or permanent disabilities, sexual violence against women and girls, destruction or occupation of houses, shops, and other businesses, ruination or occupation of agricultural fields, abandonment, closure, or destruction of places of worship, and the displacement of individuals into precarious situations of internal displacement.

3.1 Killings in community or other attacks

Overall numbers for October to December 2023 as compared to October to December 2022

Table 5 presents a comparison of the data regarding killings in community-based attacks or other attacks for both reporting periods:

- In Q4-2021, there were a total of 539 attacks resulting in civilian casualties, with 156 (29%) attacks targeting communities and 383 (71%) other attacks. In Q4-2022, the total number of attacks rose to 568, with 97 (17%) attacks directed at communities and 471 (83%) other attacks.
- The number of attacks on communities resulting in killings decreased by 38% in Q4-2022 compared to Q4-2021. Conversely, the number of other attacks resulting in killings increased by 23% during the same period.
- In Q4-2021, the total number of civilians killed from the attacks was 1,268. Among them, 845 (67%) were killed in attacks on communities, while 423 (33%) were killed in other attacks.
- During Q4-2022, the number of civilians killed in attacks amounted to 1,189. Out of these casualties, 656 (55%) occurred in attacks on communities, whereas 533 (45%) were killed in other attacks.
- In both Q4-2021 and Q4-2022, the majority of civilians killed were victims of attacks on communities.
- In Q4-2021, the average number of civilians killed per attack was calculated as 2.4, with an average of

- 5.4 civilians killed per attack on communities and 1.1 civilians killed per other attack.
- In Q4-2022, the average number of civilians killed per attack was 2.2, with an average of 6.8 civilians killed per attack on communities and 1.3 civilians killed per other attack.
- The distinction between attacks resulting in killings on communities and other attacks remained consistent in Q4-2021 and Q4-2022, with the average number of civilians killed per community attack being 5 to 7 times higher than per other attack.

3.2 Abductions in community or other attacks

Overall numbers for October to December 2023 as compared to October to December 2022

Table 6 provides a comparison of the data concerning abductions during community-based attacks and other attacks for both reporting periods.

- The total number of incidents involving civilians abducted was 192 in Q4-2021, with 86 (45%) attacks targeting communities and 106 (55%) other attacks. In Q4-2022, the total number of attacks decreased to 181, with 61 (34%) attacks on communities and 120 (66%) other attacks.
- The number of attacks involving abductions on communities decreased by 29% in Q4-2022 compared

to Q4-2021. However, there was a 13% increase in other attacks.

- In Q4-2021, the total number of civilians abducted during the attacks amounted to 1,404. Out of these, 868 (62%) were abducted during attacks on communities, while 536 (38%) were abducted during other attacks.
- In Q4-2022, the total number of civilians abducted during the attacks increased to 1,756. Among these, 727 (41%) were abducted during attacks on communities, while 1,029 (59%) were abducted during other attacks.
- While in Q4-2021 the majority of civilians abducted were victims of attacks on communities, in Q4-2022 the majority were abducted during other attacks.
- In Q4-2021, the average number of civilians abducted per attack was calculated as 7.3, with an average of 10.1 civilians abducted per attack on communities and 5.1 civilians abducted per other attack.
- In Q4-2022, the average number of civilians abducted per attack was 9.7, with an average of 11.9 civilians abducted per attack on communities and 8.6 civilians abducted per other attack.
- In both Q4-2021 and Q4-2022, the average number of civilians abducted per community attack was approximately 1.5 to 2 times higher than per other attack. For both categories of attacks, the average numbers were significantly higher for abductions compared to killings.

Appendix 6A and 6B provide state-specific details for the reporting periods. It is important to note that the analysis above focuses on "civilian victims" specifically, while 6A and 6B offer a comprehensive view of all victims.

4. Age and Gender of Christian victims

This section offers an initial examination of the age and gender groups of the Christian victims.

It is important to note that this aspect was included in the data collection process starting from the latter half of 2022, so the information available is not yet complete. It is anticipated that future reports will provide more comprehensive data as the data collection methods improve. The initial analysis presents the overall count of men, women, boys, and girls for both killings and abductions. Table 7 and 8 present a summary at the geopolitical level, while specific state-level details can be found in appendix 7A and 7B.

For the purpose of this report, a child is defined as an individual below the age of 18 years old⁶.

4.1 Killings – age and gender of Christians

Table 7 presents detailed data on the age and gender of victims in all attacks involving Christian killings during the period of October to December 2022. It should be noted that this data was not systematically collected in the previous year, so there is no available comparison data. However, future reports will strive to include such data when feasible.

Here are the key findings for this reporting period:

- Out of the 818 Christians killed, detailed information was available for 377 victims (46%).
- Among the victims with available information, 326 were identified as Christian adults (40%), while 50 were identified as Christian children or youth (6%). The age of 441 Christians killed (54%) remained unknown. Notably, in both attacks on communities and other attacks, a significantly higher number of Christian adults were killed compared to Christian children (over 7 times more).
- Among the victims with available information, 289 were identified as Christian males (35%) and 87 were identified as Christian females (11%). The gender of 441 Christians killed (54%) remained unknown. Similarly, in both attacks on communities and other attacks, a significantly higher number of Christian males were killed compared to Christian females (over 3 times more).

4.2 Abductions - age and gender of Christians

Table 8 provides detailed data on the age and gender of victims in all attacks involving Christian abductions during the period of October to December 2023. Similar to the previous year, this data was not systematically collected, making it difficult to provide a direct comparison. However, future reports will aim to include such data when feasible.

Here are the key findings for this reporting period:

- Out of the 953 Christians abducted, detailed information was available for 312 victims (33%).
- Among the victims with available information, 259 were identified as Christian adults (27%), while 53 were identified as Christian children or youth (6%). The age of 641 Christians abducted (67%) remained unknown. Notably, in both attacks on communities and other attacks, a significantly higher number of Christian adults were abducted compared to Christian children (5 times more). (For comparison, in terms of Christians killed, there were more than 7 times more Christian adults killed than Christian children.)
- Among the victims with available information, 153 were identified as Christian males (16%) and 160 were identified as Christian females (17%). The gender of 641 Christians abducted (67%) remained unknown. Interestingly, during the attacks on communities and other attacks, the number of Christian males abducted and the number of Christian females abducted were nearly the same, with slightly more Christian females abducted than Christian males. (For comparison, in terms of Christians killed, there were more than 3 times more Christian males killed than Christian females.)
